# Reflections From Rick

Christmas is over and the beautiful carols we've been listening to are set aside for another year.

There is one hymn that continues to come to my mind and speak to me. It is the hymn entitled, *The Babe of Bethlehem*, written years ago by Henry Beer. I love this hymn because it connects the dots between the wonderful birth of Jesus, our Savior, and His journey to the cross.

There are several lovely phrases in this hymn that are worthwhile spending time in meditation.

In verse one, the hymnwriter laments, "Alas, how many only know the Savior as a child." It is so important to note that God came to earth in the person of Jesus. We recognize that He was perfect, without sin and that He was born of a virgin and laid in that humble manger. It was the beginning of the "good tidings of great joy." However, it was only the beginning.

Perhaps, it doesn't leave us with the cheery feeling that the manger scene gives us. It is, however, essential that we exercise faith in the death of Jesus Christ and His shed blood.

As the final words of the hymn instruct us, "Then open wide the door of heart. And let the Savior in."

May He find entrance in all our hearts as we enter this new year.

As of this issue of *News From The Haven*, we have transitioned our mailing list and are now only mailing the full newsletter four times a year to people who have requested to be on the mailing list.


A number of recipients have chosen to convert to the email version of *News From The Haven*. You can expect to receive that email four times a year.

# Thoughts from Dave's Desk ...

Greetings from Dave's Desk!

Except the LORD build the house, They labour in vain that build it: Except the LORD keep the city, The watchman waketh but in vain.—Psalm 127:1

As another year on the calendar rolls past us, we look back in awe, inspired by the work of God in our ministry here at Fairview Haven.

In 2023, our team of 200-plus employees were blessed to serve 138 residents on our campus. Additionally, 76 clients were reached through our Connections Home Services. Our ministry partners contributed around \$600,000 through the year which was the exact amount we needed to maintain our fivestar quality of care. We were able to accomplish several upgrades including a much needed major overhaul of our dining room (it still had the original flooring), remodels of several rooms and apartments and upgrades to several HVAC systems to name a few.

Fairview Haven's mission statement is "an Apostolic Christian community where choice is valued, growth is encouraged and life abounds." While Fairview Haven is well known for the excellent care offered to our loved ones and the family during the dying process, our mission is not one of a hospice facility where we only provide assistance for the dying. Generally speaking, people do move onto our campus in the later years of life, however, we have people living throughout our campus at a wide variety of ages and care needs. Regardless of age or how much care a person may need, it is our mission at Fairview Haven to provide abundant life from the time the person moves on our campus until the last breath.

We often find there is a major misconception that people shouldn't move to the campus of Fairview Haven until they are absolutely in need. And we have found that this misconception often delays people from getting the best care that they can get in a timely way, which can have a devastating impact.

(I do understand that, from a cost perspective, we want to maintain living at the most economical arrangement as long as possible. This is why it has been so important for the Administration and Board of Directors to continue exploring options for lower cost environments.)

When people live in an environment that is less than adequate in providing for their safety and care needs, their overall health and safety is at risk. And, while moving to a level of care suitable for current needs will not guarantee that an incident will not occur, it diminishes the risk significantly.

Also, we have often experienced that caregivers (typically spouses) who are trying to maintain a living arrangement and provide care will frequently suffer consequences to their own health.

As you consider moving someone to a different level of care, you should also consider the wellbeing of the caregivers involved in that person's care. Typically, we observe that transitioning a person to a higher level of care will improve the health of the caregiver. With the burdens of daily care and responsibilities alleviated, the spouse/caregiver is able to support and spend quality time with the person.

Additionally, we often find that it is optimal to transition loved ones who have memory issues or dementia to a higher care CONTINUED ON PAGE 9

setting earlier in the process. The person has a much easier transition as he/she is able to acclimate to the new environment in earlier stages when cognitive capabilities are more intact. As a person progresses into later stages of dementia or increased memory issues, it becomes much more challenging to adapt to a new living arrangement.

Late transitions can lead to increased confusion, aggressive/combative behavior, compromised dignity, safety concerns and health issues.

If there is one thing that I have learned over my lifetime, it is that, while we human beings are a lot alike in many aspects, we are all uniquely created and what works for one person may or may not work for the next person. I say this to make it clear that those of us working at Fairview Haven/Serenity Villa do not have all the answers as to when you or your loved one should make the decision to move to a higher level of care.

On the other hand, experience has taught us and we have witnessed so many situations where someone has experienced tragedy or a difficult transition that could have potentially been different had that person moved earlier. And, while we have seen some situations where a loved one made a decision to move too early, that is a rare circumstance.

\* \* \* \* \*

"Oh, I didn't know your mom (or your dad or family member) was *that bad*?" This is a comment that is often said when people hear that someone has moved into Serenity Villa.

If you have ever had that thought, we'd like to share a different perspective. Likely, the person and/or family caregivers are actually being proactive in the decision to move to Serenity Villa. They are assessing the future and recognizing that they could possibly prevent more difficulties by earlier intervention.

It is most advantageous to consider moving into Serenity Villa: 1) when the person has adequate cognition to help make the transition less difficult; and 2) when a caregiver is expressing the feeling of being overwhelmed or experiencing burnout, frustration, and minor health concerns.

My final thought is this: I wish we would change the way we often look at people living with dementia. The tendency can be to view them as a burden or as not worth much. People living with dementia have much value and deserve the same dignity and respect as anyone else. In some cases, they find it difficult themselves to preserve their dignity and that is why we have places like Serenity Villa to help them.

Serenity Villa is a beautiful, safe haven where our loved ones live an abundant life in a cozy environment surrounded by people who love them.

Come visit or volunteer—there are valuable lessons to be learned from visiting with any older people. Let's recognize the value of all people and educate ourselves about their unique needs. Please help us dispel any stigma related to aging or dementia by expanding education and awareness.

When we understand the profound value that God places on any human life, we will also cherish and value each person, regardless of needs, diagnoses or age.


