Reflections From Rick

At Fairview Haven, we have been discussing professionalism. The question that we've discussed is: "Who on our team at Fairview Haven is considered to be a professional?"

A number of teammates on our Fairview Haven campus responded and I would like to sum up some of their thoughts as follows:

- Every role at Fairview Haven falls into that category.
- We are all professionals as all of us serve our customers.
- We are all trained in our positions and that feels like professionalism to me .
- Every teammate is sharing with residents, teammates, and families, so every role needs to be professional.
- Every position has a professional degree to it... some add more human traits to it and some add more professional characteristics.
- Everyone on campus is a professional; it is a way you conduct yourself.
- Each one holds a special talent or gift that no one else in the organization could replace.
- Having an awareness of our mission, values, and principles builds professionalism.
- Focus on the words; diligence, and teamwork. They make professionalism complete.
- Feels like professionalism should include Christ's words of serving.
- We share our care with all we serve and that makes us approachable and easy to follow.
- Servant leadership is essential for our team.

Each professional attribute on the team blends together and makes the team better.

It seems that professionalism includes empathy. That helps us interact professionally.

My thoughts go to: "How do I interact with a person? How do

I *think* about a person?" Because how I interact with the person usually stems from how I think about him/her. If I think of the person as having great value and being worthy of respect, love and service, then I will tend to interact with him/her that way. If I think of the person as only annoying or frustrating or not having value, my thoughts will often come out in the way that I interact with him/her. Also the way I talk about the person to others defines my professionalism. It is a challenge to me personally to value and respect people (each individual) and love and serve them as Jesus would. Each person is worthy of time, attention and love. To me, in our ministry of serving and caring for people, this defines a professional. And – by that definition – we have a lot of wonderful professionals among us.

As you can see, the focus of our discussion related to the opportunity to serve our precious residents. No one was impressed with a lofty degree or fancy suit. We are thankful to serve on a team that recognizes the need to treat each person with care and respect.

I learned long ago, when interviewing a prospective teammate, it is important to hire someone who knows how to play nice in the sandbox. Great skills are a plus, but we need to be able to work together to accomplish the most for those we serve. A teammate who thinks he/she is the best and alone can deliver great care, needs to be reminded, at best, we are each only here a finite number of hours per week.

Great care needs to be delivered 24/7 and requires a team. When we work together and share and care, we create the best possible envi-

Exciting new ventures in therapy

Exciting new changes are happening on our campus this year in the realm of therapy and rehab!

First, we are happy to introduce our new Physical Rehab program.

In February 2022, we began our partnership with PTS for therapy services. We feel that our potential to provide high quality and effective therapy services has grown since partnering with them to operate our own in-house therapy department.

One of those areas of growth lies in the addition of another layer of therapy called Physical Rehab. This program is classified as “functional maintenance” by Medicare, and consists of regular, targeted exercise sessions to maintain improvements made by the more aggressive therapy regimens of traditional Medicare A or B therapy.

While it is inevitable that age, at some point, brings functional decline, it is our experience that this decline can often be slowed or postponed with the proper treatment. We believe that everyone deserves to maintain the highest level of function and physical ability of which they are capable.

Frequently, we see people making steady improvements while they are receiving traditional therapy. When they reach a plateau and are no longer able to show gains in their therapy, Medicare no longer will pay for continued therapy. At that point, the treatment regimen stops. Without regular targeted exercises, the gains a person has made in strength, balance, or dexterity slowly wane until a person is once again at a point where therapy is needed, and the cycle begins again.

Traditional Medicare A therapy is

for aggressive recovery, usually after a surgery or significant illness. Typically, a hospital stay of at least three nights is required to qualify. Medicare A pays for therapy, room, and board, but only for a limited time.

Medicare B is similar, without the hospital stay requirements, and the therapy regimen is often not as aggressive. Medicare B pays for the therapy only. Typically, this is used for those who have not met the requirements for Medicare A coverage but are in need of therapy after an injury, illness, or decline.

The phase that we are introducing is functional maintenance or, in other words, doing what we can to prevent declines and injury. Medicare will pay for an initial assessment by a physical therapist, who will write an individualized, targeted treatment plan which is then carried out by one of our Certified Rehab Aids. We have three CNAs who recently finished their certification course to become professionals in physical rehab.

While Medicare covers the initial evaluation, the sessions themselves are not covered and will be paid out-of-pocket. The treatment frequency could be anywhere from one to five sessions

per week, depending on individual needs or desires. Anyone can go directly on a physical rehab plan or it could be something that is suggested after completing a therapy regimen to maintain the gains the person made with traditional therapy.

Also, this program is not limited to residents in the Fairview Haven care center. We are able to offer this service to anyone living on the Fairview Haven campus. And we will be able to serve outpatient clients.

Another exciting development that we are looking forward to is our new outpatient therapy gym, scheduled for completion this fall. It will be a great place for folks in the community to work out or we will be able to serve any therapy needs. We are thrilled to be able to offer these enhanced services and would love to hear from you if you are interested. Watch for more details in upcoming newsletters!


Dan's wife, Kathy, previously worked in the Fairview Haven business office for nine years.

love to feel the wind in my hair; it feels so wonderful!"



Remote Car Races made an exciting day! A race track, including curves and a bridge, was set up in the main dining room. The coveted prizes for the winners were gas cards from Casey's.


