Reflections From Rick

Psalm 39:5: "Behold, thou hast made my days as an handbreadth; and mine age is as nothing before thee: verily every man at his best state is altogether vanity."

I don't think that God shares this verse with us to discourage us, but it is just a reminder to us that we are not here for long and soon our days on earth will come to an end. In the fourth verse of this chapter, we are encouraged to know our end and measure our days to see how frail we are.

With the Psalms as our backdrop, we acknowledge that our community, both outside of Fairview Haven and within our campus, have experienced this brevity of life. It seems that every newsletter shares the loss of our beloved residents but, in the last month alone, we have said last farewells to seven souls. Each one was 89 years old or older. I am reminded of a phrase my grandfather used to say: the old must die and the young can die.

Our community at large has experienced this recently with the loss of three young men. Two were seniors at our local high school. Both of these young men had relatives who work or volunteer on the Fairview Haven campus. The third individual was the son of a recently retired team member and nephew to another. These deaths have touched our campus and our community. They serve to remind us that we too one day will make a journey from this life.

Each time we lose a dear loved one, it creates a hole in our hearts and our lives. May the reality of death compel us to make each day that God gives us a cherished gift.

I was touched recently at a funeral of a resident when I realized that I learned more about that soul in death than I learned while she was living.

It behooves me to learn more about those I interact with so that I can know them well in the fullness of life.

Have I been sensitive and thoughtful in what I shared with them? Have I taken time to let them know my appreciation and admiration for who they are?

At Fairview Haven, we are blessed to be able to spend time and share conversation with our older loved ones. By forming relationships with them, we can give and receive love from them. It is such a blessing to be able to experience such meaningful relationships as part of our normal work reality.

We love having young and energized team members who get to experience this firsthand. I hadn't intended this article as an advertisement for employment but, when I think about it, who among us wouldn't be better off to have learned this in our youth?

If you have never considered enriching your life or the life of others by joining our team, please consider it now. We would love to learn and grow with you.

Each month that goes by, I realize how short my work time is growing as I seem to be the oldest employee around. It won't be long, and I may be needing Fairview Haven's services. Please think about whether God wants you to come share your love with folks like me!

Happy 100th, Marjorie Witzig! NEWS FROM THE HAVEN—PAGE 3

Marjorie Witzig celebrated her 100th birthday with a family celebration on April 23.

The oldest child of George and Louise (Grusy) Gramm, Marjorie was born on April 20, 1923 in Gridley. Her parents were farmers near Gridley. Her father served as a minister in the Gridley Apostolic Christian Church.

Marjorie's brother Donald (Rosie) Gramm currently lives at Fairview Haven also. Her other siblings - Harold, Robert, Herbert and Mildred - are deceased.

Marjorie attended the Four Corners country school through the eighth grade. She enjoyed school, especially geography and art. When she graduated from the eighth grade, she received the highest test score among students in McLean County. That year, her sister, Mildred, was born. Millie required special care as she was developmentally disabled and her mother needed Marjorie's help with the family. So she wasn't able to go to high school.

When Marjorie was 16, her mother bought an electric sewing machine. Along with that purchase came free sewing lessons in Peoria. Marjorie went with some friends and discovered she had a talent and love for sewing. She created her first intricate outfit, including a hand-embroidered blouse.

"Sewing was my specialty," she says, and she continued using this gift until she moved into Fairview Estates in 2019. She sewed all her own clothes, as well as for her daughters and grandchildren. She created teddy bears and baby blankets for each of her grandchildren. Also she enjoyed knitting and crocheting. She knitted sweaters for family members, including her brothers. She says she felt "accomplished" when she could iron twelve of her brothers' shirts in an hour.

At age 17, Marjorie sought a relationship with God in repentance and

gave her life to following Him. She became a member of the Gridley Apostolic Christian Church.

Marjorie says she "got her education" when she worked for family in Chicago. She cleaned

and cooked for them during the winter months (November-March). During that time, she learned to get around Chicago, riding the L trains. She and her cousin and other friends who worked there had Thursday afternoons off. They went downtown to shop or tour museums. Or they went to church together on Thursday evenings and Sundays.

On Oct. 21, 1945, Marjorie married Elmer Witzig. Elmer had just returned from 3 ½ years in the Army, where he served during World War II. They had four children: Roger (Elaine) Witzig and Curt (Norma) Witzig of Gridley; Virginia Zeller of Carmel, IN and Edith (Ron) Bollier of Greenfield, IN. There are 20 grandchildren and 81 greatgrandchildren. Most of them were able to attend Marjorie's 100th birthday celebration.

Marjorie and Elmer were grain and livestock farmers near Gridley. Four years after their marriage, Elmer was chosen as a minister in the Gridley Apostolic Christian Church. It was an un-

expected transition for the Witzigs. But Marjorie says, "It was really a blessing" as they then traveled to most of the churches in the U.S. when serving in the ministry and were able to get to know many people.

Marjorie also recalls a special journey to Europe when their son, Roger, was stationed near Munich, Germany. He had three weeks of furlough so they rented a camper and traveled around England, France and Switzerland, as well as Germany. Marjorie's Grusy ancestors came from the Black Forest region in Germany and the Witzig ancestry stemmed from Zurich, Switzerland, and they spent time in those areas and connected with cousins there.

Another special trip was in 1992, when they went to visit friends, Bob and Pearl Miller in Oregon and traveled together to see the Redwoods in CA and to Mt. St. Helens in WA.

In 1993, Elmer retired from active service in the ministry. The Witzigs lived in Gridley and continued to stay

May 28, 2023 will be my 15 year anniversary at Fairview Haven. For that reason, I wanted to share a part of my story with you all. I believe everything happens for a reason, regardless of how much joy or pain comes to me. So, from the bottom of my heart, I want to say thank you for loving me, even when there are times I want to run away. To the residents (present and past): each of you has become a grandparent that I wish I'd had in my life. Thank you for allowing me to love you for 15 years – and many more. To my friends at Fairview Haven: you all have brought me so

much joy and love that will last a lifetime. From the bottom of my heart, each of you are a superhero in my eyes. Life is much brighter with you in it.

My name was Guo Yu Quan before I was adopted in May of 2001. I grew up in an

orphanage in China.

I'll tell you how I ended up in the orphanage. My biological father told me that we were having a daughter and father day. I was excited. He then took me to a police station and dropped me off by a train. I was around nine years old and didn't fully understand what all was happening. But I did comprehend the fact that I was unwanted and abandoned. It was the worst feeling in the world. And that day, I learned that I can't trust people, especially men.

Once I arrived at the orphanage, I saw a lot of other kids, both older and younger than me. It took time to adjust, but I never had problems making friends with them and they became my siblings.

As an older girl in the orphanage, I looked after the younger ones. I changed their cloth diapers and clothes and played with them. I enjoyed this tremendously. (Except for the many many cloth diapers ③) As an orphan, I didn't look forward to going to school. Kids there were not nice to me because I didn't have parents. I was picked on quite a bit. I was always a quiet and shy girl at school.

I still had contact with my biological grandparents who lived on a farm. And I had the privilege of visiting them when I wanted to. After about a year or so, I lost touch with them.

I have always been thankful to have what I needed: clothes, food, people and, most of all, courage and strength. I thank God for that every day.

So all three of us ended up in the same family and none of us were blood-related, but we all loved each other very much.

After I came to Fairbury, I remember my mom would take me to Dave's with the Chinese dictionary so I could learn English. Besides "Hi," I didn't know any words. My sister Guo Dan was still speaking some Chinese with me, but mostly we tried to learn English.

My first job was delivering the newspaper once a week with Guo Dan and my mom's help. After about 10 years, I quit that job. Winter was definitely my least favorite season.

As a middle sister, I followed Guo Dan everywhere. When she started working at Fairview Haven as a high schooler, guess what? I wanted to be there also. I was hired May 2008 as a junior in high school. I was so afraid of the residents, especially the people in wheelchairs. To this day, I remember that when I was interviewed for the job in the kitchen, Walter Teubel said to me: "Your sister is a good worker, so we will give you a chance." I just smiled at him.
